What Are You Growing This Winter!

With winter just around the corner, and outdoor gardening over for another season, consider growing your produce year-round - all indoors! I started growing vegetables on my tower gardens two years ago and have found it to be so rewarding!

What is a tower garden? It is a vertical aeroponic system that does not require soil. It only uses water and a special nutrient solution that trickles down over the plant roots.

I grow a variety of greens, herbs, tomatoes, and peppers on my towers. Everything tastes so fresh! I have 28 plants growing on one tower in just over a square meter of floor space, and 32 plants growing on a second, smaller tower taking up less than a square meter of space. Each tower has LED lights and a water pump that are both on timers, so the tower gardens continue to grow even in my absence.

I was pleasantly surprised during last winter's bitterly cold weather to walk into my office where I keep my towers. It was like a breath of fresh spring air each time! I was welcomed with the wonderful smell of fresh vegetation, beautiful greenery, bright lights, and the calming waterfall effect of the water pump.

Growing our own food year-round has been such a positive experience on so many levels that I am happy to share my story. I love to talk gardening!

Provide your Feedback Heritage Communities Local Area Planning Project: Update

Working together, we're creating a local area plan to help guide growth, change, and redevelopment in the Heritage Communities (Kelvin Grove, Eagle Ridge, Chinook Park, Kingsland, Haysboro, Southwood, Willow Park, Maple Ridge, Acadia, and Fairview and three Industrial areas: Fairview Industrial, East Fairview Industrial, and Glendeer Business Park).

Redevelopment is a natural part of a community's life cycle, which often begins when communities reach a certain age and homes, buildings and amenities need to be revitalized or replaced. When a neighbourhood reaches an age and stage when revitalization and redevelopment naturally start to happen, a local area plan is a helpful tool to have in place. Through local area planning, we look at the fabric of a specific local area, the community's vision for the evolution of the area, the ideal places to accommodate growth, and how to make the best use of limited land – to enhance places and spaces to live, work and play.

Over the fall, we've been working closely with our Heritage Communities working group and community association representatives to reconnect on the project following some impacts on timelines due to the COVID-19 pandemic. We've created an initial draft of the first chapter of the local area plan, based on feedback and input collected through initial public engagement (fall 2019 to spring 2020). The first chapter of the local area plan outlines the area's rich history (past), the area as it exists today (present), the vision for the area and core values that support this vision (future).

SAFE & SOUND

Cold Weather Safety

Emergency Medical Services (EMS) paramedics respond to a number of cold weather-related emergencies every winter. However, by taking appropriate measures to dress properly, anticipate sudden weather changes and preparing to be out in the cold, may reduce your risk of sustaining a cold weather illness/injury. It's also advised you store an emergency kit in your vehicle at all times containing extra clothing, blankets and other road-side supplies.

Frostnip

- •Frost-nipped skin is extremely cold, but not yet frozen skin;
- It commonly affects the ears, nose, cheeks, fingers and toes;
 The skin may look red and possibly feel numb to the touch;
- •When treated promptly, frostnip usually heals without complication;
- •Move to a warm environment and immediately, but gently, re-warm the affected area through skin to skin contact (i.e. hand covering tips of ears).

Frostbite

- •Frostbite occurs when skin becomes so cold, the skin and underlying tissues freeze;
- •Affected skin may look white and waxy and will feel hard to the touch;
- •Move to a warm environment immediately and place the affected area in warm, *not hot*, water until fully re-warmed;
- •Call 9-1-1 or seek further medical attention as required.

Hypothermia

- •Hypothermia is abnormally low body temperature, less than 34°C (as compared to normal body temperature of about 37°C);
- •Early hypothermia may manifest as profound shivering; moderate hypothermic patients may act inappropriately: stumbling, mumbling, and fumbling, as their body temperature continues to drop resulting in severe hypothermia (<30°C);
- •Left untreated, severe hypothermia may progress to unconsciousness or death;
- •Early recognition and prompt medical attention is key. Call 9-1-1. Don't forget to protect yourself from the factors that originally lead to the patient's situation;
- Initiate gentle re-warming as quickly as possible. Remove any wet or constrictive clothing; cover with blankets or sleeping bags. Protect from further heat loss: eliminate contact with cold surfaces, and shield from wind and moisture.

Snow Bans Restricted Parking Map: Online Map Shows Calgary's Snow Route Parking Bans

December marks the potential for snowfall in the city and this means snow bans can come into effect. Know which routes are snow routes before making an outing to ensure a smooth trip and ease of parking – use The City of Calgary's online map that shows banned parking locations.

The Snow Route Parking Bans map shows where parking is temporarily restricted on designated snow routes. Parking bans may last up to 72 hours following a parking ban being issued by The City. This map is located at https://maps.calgary.ca/SnowRouteParkingBans/.

WAV Calgary Speedily Dispatches On-Demand Wheelchair Accessible Taxis

The average wait time for people requesting taxis that are wheelchair accessible has dropped to 15 to 18 minutes from hours thanks to a dispatch service launched in 2019.

WAV Calgary (Wheelchair Accessible Vehicle Calgary) is an on-demand, centralized dispatch service for wheelchair accessible taxis. It pools the services of active, licenced wheelchair accessible taxis and drivers operating in the city and provides customers with one point of contact to request an accessible taxi.

The goal of WAV Calgary is to reduce wait times and improve service levels by providing customers with more accurate wait time information for the closest accessible taxi. The 15 to 18-minute wait time is comparable to other taxi services in Calgary, where the wait time goal is 15 minutes.

Customers can contact WAV Calgary 24 hours a day to book an accessible taxi via phone (403-974-1110), website (WAVCalgary.com), or app (available for both Android and Apple devices).

WAV Calgary has continued to operate throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, ensuring customers have access to safe transportation in accessible taxis, which provide door-to-door service in private vehicles.

The City of Calgary is committed to identifying solutions for providing efficient taxi service to those individuals requiring a wheelchair accessible taxi.

The City regulates the taxi industry in Calgary and is monitoring the wheelchair accessible service. Customers are encouraged to call 311 with compliments and complaints. All complaints are investigated.
