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

## **Window and Balcony Safety**

With the return of warmer weather, Emergency Medical Services (EMS) would like to remind parents and caregivers of an often-overlooked hazard in the home – access to open windows. Every year, paramedics respond to emergencies where a child has fallen from an open window, often from the second floor. These can be avoided by following safety measures. Take the time to assess potential hazards in your home before a preventable fall occurs.

#### **Windows and Screens**

- Prevent access to windows by moving furniture such as cribs, beds, stools, and change tables out from under them.
- Keep drapery cords out of children's' reach. Wrap excess cord around cleats, or tie-downs to avoid a choking hazard.
- Remember, screens are not safety devices. They are designed to keep bugs out, not children in.

#### Balconies

- Do not underestimate a child's ability to climb. Furniture and other items stored on balconies and decks can be used to climb resulting in falls over the railing.
- Ensure that your balcony railings are not more than 10 cm (4 inch) apart. This will eliminate access between the vertical bars of a balcony, or deck.

#### **Further Prevention Tips**

- Toddlers and preschoolers are at highest risk of falling from a window, or balcony, but it may happen at any age.
- Direct supervision of children is the single most effective way to prevent falls from windows and balconies.
- Install safety devices which limit the distance in which a window be can open to a maximum of 10cm (4 inches).
- Ensure the safety device can be released quickly, so the window can be used for escape in case of emergency.
- Consider purchasing a portable air conditioner, which will enable windows to stay closed and secure.

EMS is proud to be a member of the Partners Promoting Window and Balcony Safety. Take time to assess your home for window and balcony hazards and eliminate the risks before a preventable fall occurs.

My name is Andrew Gidden, and this is my third year as a board member for the Fairview Community Association (CA).

I have lived in Fairview with my wife and 2 sons for the last 15 years. My wife and I were both born and raised in Victoria and moved to Calgary in 2007 so my wife could complete her Masters in Social Work. In a matter of 1.5 years of being here, we got married, had a baby, and bought a house in Fairview.

When we first moved here, I really didn't have proper knowledge of all the city's communities and the north versus south debate. I 'stumbled' across Fairview one day after being at the stampede. We were invited to a friend's house for a BBQ, and it was here where he sold us on moving to Fairview. We loved its larger lots, mature trees, and close proximity to downtown. However, as time has passed, we have come to realize that Fairview offers way more than this. Its close access to amenities, public transit, schools, and major roadways makes it, what I believe, one of Calgary's best communities.

Before I joined the board, I knew some neighbors who were on the CA board. I would hear them talk about community issues and events they were hosting. As our friendships grew, I would volunteer at events. Volunteering turned into attending the CA's Annual General meetings and the always entertaining Wine and Cheese annual fundraiser. It was here at these events that I started thinking about the importance of community and reflecting on how fortunate we were to move to Fairview. It wasn't until after the collapse of the Fairview arena, that I committed to join the Fairview CA. #### YOUR CITY OF CALGARY

#### **Park Cart Smart**

When you set out your blue, green, and black carts properly, you're helping to ensure safe and efficient operation of The City's waste collection trucks. That includes how you park on the street outside your home, especially in cul-de-sacs. A few simple reminders will help make everyone's day go smoothly:



- When parking in a cul-de-sac, all vehicles must be parallel parked with passenger side wheels to the curb, unless there are signs permitting angle parking. This helps collection trucks reach your carts and turn around in a cul-de-sac.
- Place your carts on flat ground, one metre away from your vehicle if parked on the street.
- Improperly parked vehicles block driveways for residents and restrict access for emergency and waste management vehicles.
- When parking in an alley, do not block the end of a closed alley with parked vehicles. Collection trucks need space to turn around safely.

These simple but important steps help ensure safe and efficient cart collection. Learn more at calgary. ca/cartplacement.

## **Mental Health Awareness**

Does what you say and do each day affect your mental wellness in a positive or negative way?

People feel a wide range of emotions every day. We feel frustration when stuck in traffic and joy when we laugh with our friends. We can feel happiness and sadness all at once. This is normal.

Because normal human emotions change so fast and vary so widely, they can sometimes seem overpowering. It is important for each of us to discover our own effective ways for managing strong feelings. Our emotions have a big impact on our mental wellness. To be our best selves, we must try to create balance between our minds, hearts, and emotions.

# These ideas can help us manage our emotions and feel more in control.

- **Breathing:** Take a deep breath, hold it, and then slowly release. Repeat as needed. Deep breathing exercises are good for our nervous systems, help us check in with our feelings, and raise awareness about how the things we do or think can affect us positively or negatively.
- Mindfulness: Dealing with negative feelings like anger, frustration, and nervousness may leave us feeling hopeless. Instead of avoiding feelings, being mindful of them helps our brains learn ways to cope that we can use in the future. Ask yourself, "How have I successfully managed this feeling in the past?"
- Name it to tame it: Naming our feelings can help us feel in control. Ask yourself, "What am I feeling?" Try to go further than just "happy" or "sad". It is good practice to regularly explore our feelings and how they change.
- Practice self-care and gratitude: Eat healthy foods, drink water, and get enough sleep. Avoid gossip and discussing or dwelling on the negative. Choose instead to focus on and emphasize the positive things you see and hear.
- **Journal:** Writing helps us reflect on our feelings and explore how we can deal with them.
- Pause: Sometimes we need to distract ourselves temporarily to avoid negative feelings or overreaction. Walk around the neighborhood, help others, or do something that brings you joy and emphasizes the good things in your life!

Every action we take, big or small, has the power to contribute to or take away from our mental wellness. Check in with yourself and find what works to support you. After all, you know yourself best!



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#### Let's Talk Real Estate



As of April 9, 2022, there are no active listings in Fairview.

From January 1/22 there have been 21 sales that were comprised of 2 new listings and 1 home that was on the market for over 110 days and listed in 2021. Excluding that sale, the average days on market are 3.38 including the ones with conditions such as financing and home inspection. If there were more listings there would have been more sales.

In the last 3 months my advertising was focused on the testimonials and recommendations from recent Sellers who only paid a listing fee of \$2,500. Why would you pay more for 3.38 days on the open market?
